Go to any university campus on the day of graduation and you will be seized by a contagious energy, the expression of four years of intensive study coming to fruition and the potential of great things to come.

At EARTH University on December 11, 2009, the feeling in the air was nearly as thick as the tropical campus's humidity level, and far more exhilarating. Unlike most universities,

EARTH's graduating class included a diverse body of students from regions near and remote, many of whom boldly made their first trip outside their countries four years ago to pursue their dreams at EARTH.

During the ceremony the Institution presented EARTH University Foundation Trustee Ms. Jane Black with a Doctor in Humanities Honoris Causa for her commitment, generosity, vision and leadership to EARTH. In a moving acceptance, Jane expressed her happiness in seeing student Adalice Drakeford recognized with the EARTH Prize during the same ceremony, as Adalice is the first recipient of the endowed scholarship established in the memory of Jane's son, Emory Black.

Two other new graduates, Valodia Flores of Nicaragua and Kevlin Soto of Costa Rica, were recognized for a project they completed on sustainable management of high-impact solid waste for the well-being of humid tropics' communities. The prize was awarded for the first time by The Sustainability Laboratories to the graduation project that best fulfilled the principles of sustainability.

The 2009 Commencement Ceremony officially kicked off the University's 20th Anniversary, which will be celebrated with events and activities throughout the year 2010.

In the weeks following the tragic earthquake that hit the capital of Haiti on Tuesday, January 12, we received many concerned inquiries regarding the well-being of our Haitian students and alumni.

Just before the devastating event, five new Haitian students arrived on campus to begin their studies at EARTH University. As you can imagine, these students were extremely concerned about the well-being of their loved ones back home. Since the quake, we have been able to confirm the safety of the immediate family of four of these new students; however, several lost extended family members and friends. It is with great sadness to inform you that one student lost a sister in the disaster. I spoke with her recently and while this is a very painful time for her, she is committed to completing her studies at EARTH in order to return to help her country.

Our five returning Haitian students in second, third and fourth year have made it back to campus safely and thankfully, we have been able to confirm the location and safety of all six of our Haitian alumni.

Our hearts go out to Haiti and especially to our Haitian students and alumni. The administration, faculty, staff and students are doing everything possible to provide them with the support they need during this difficult time. In addition, we are encouraging our internal community to do what they can to help the aid effort in Haiti and have established an internal collection to facilitate donations.

Now more than ever, Haiti needs EARTH alumni—with their leadership skills, practical experience and social commitment—to rebuild and promote peace and prosperity in this country. I'm also pleased to report that as part of EARTH Plants the Future, on June 5 EARTH and its alumni in Haiti and the Dominican Republic will be planting trees in Haiti as a symbol of hope for the future of this country and the potential of our alumni to foster lasting and positive change. Class of 1999 Strengthens Commitment to EARTH

Celebrating 10 years since graduation, a group of 11 representatives of the Class of 1999 reunited on campus in October and took the opportunity to announce the creation of a scholarship fund in the name of Lanny Rodríguez Chanto, a classmate who died in 2003. This scholarship will be for the 2011-2014 class and will cover 60 percent of the tuition cost for a new agent of change, with the intention that the University will find a matching donation to cover the difference. The class is requesting that the scholarship be given to the most qualified candidate with the greatest need from Latin America, preferably Brazil. In addition, the class pledged to actively participate in the admissions process in each of their countries. Alumnus Luis Navarro, '99, informed EARTH in a letter that, "It is now time that EARTH harvest the seeds it planted on December 12, 1999."

Alumnus Daniel Acosta, '99, who came to the reunion as well, offered the following words on behalf of his classmates, "EARTH is and will continue to be our home, our alma mater and the reason that we are leaders of change. EARTH is a special place; a magical place; a place where we feel we are always welcome and received with open arms. So thank you. Thank you so much for your hard work and your continued support. And thanks for taking care of our home."

The Flowering of EARTH-La Flor

Located in the dry tropical region of Guanacaste, the EARTH-La Flor center is still under construction but has seen recent advances. The Central American Bank for Economic Integration (CABEI) provided a \$500,000 loan in November that will cover the costs of feasibility studies for EARTH-La Flor's Technical and Entrepreneurial Innovation Center and Green Conference Center.

November also brought approval of the National Learning Institute's purchase of two hectares at EARTH-La Flor for \$560,000 to develop a training center next to Dr. Franklin Chang-Díaz's Ad Astra Rocket Company Laboratory. Talks with the National Learning Institute (INA in Spanish) and Ad Astra began more than a year ago with a mutual interest in establishing a high tech training center in Guanacaste. This will be considered a "Super INA" due to its focus on training specialists with sophisticated skills in the development of innovative materials and technology in the fields of energy, computing, programming and aerospace.

This project reflects the innovative spirit of EARTH-La Flor and will be of great significance to the development of the province of Guanacaste, helping to generate new business and employment in the region.

Class of 2013 arrives at EARTH

On January 18, 2010, 110 first-year students began their studies with the hope of receiving a world-class university education that will enable them to become agents of change in their countries. The Class of 2013 is comprised of 104 young men and women from Latin America and the Caribbean, plus five from



Mozambique and one from Kenya. Of this group, 74 percent come from rural regions and 34 percent are female. In addition to the 110 new students, five exchange students also participated in the inauguration ceremony. These students come from institutions in Norway, the United States and Canada and will be studying here during the first trimester.

During the ceremony, second-year student and member of the Student Council, Ana Catalina Mora welcomed the new class and urged her classmates to maximize their time at EARTH. *“We should urge ourselves to fully develop our abilities, to feel offended by poverty, corruption and injustice and to act to eradicate them. We must transcend the barriers of our time with the vision of leaving a better world for future generations.”*

The 2010 academic year is full of significance for EARTH. Throughout the year, the Institution will seek to share with the world its two decades of achievements in promoting sustainable development through the transformational actions of its students and alumni and its innovative educational model and programs.

Rocio Valverde –

Blazing her own Trail.



Rocio Valverde, General Manager of an eco- and adventure tourism company, lives with her two sons near Costa Rica's Arenal volcano. "I am currently 37 years old. Although I can't say I have much free time, every day I religiously run four kilometers and I keep a book on my table to read at night...My greatest passions are my sons Carlos and Juan, and then my house, art, and a good whiskey."

Always a zealous student, Rocio's desire to study at EARTH in 1993 came in part from a yearning that gripped her at the age of fifteen to "know other places and people and do things differently from the way I had been doing them until that moment."

Rocio did well at EARTH but – always the blazer of her own trail – felt a different calling in her second year. She describes how one EARTH professor helped her make "the most important decision in my life, a decision that has taken me to the place that I am today. Professor [Marvin] Weil surely won't remember it, but he told me, very much in his own style, 'I believe, Rocio, that you should be a lawyer.'"

In the late nineties, her destiny brought her to Germany to pursue postgraduate studies in environmental law. Upon her return to Costa Rica she worked for the Ministry of Security and enrolled in every course offered by Costa Rica's National Police Academy. Her credentials as lawyer and police officer led to an appointment as Director of the country's three most important airports, where she managed a force of two hundred police officers.

Rocio only has the most beautiful memories of her time at EARTH. "The work in the fields; the guys acting like gentlemen and helping the girls when work became heavy or when it rained and we got wet; the dances in Guápiles; going out to the bar Las Palmas; studying until late; sharing a big table at lunch or dinner and the different names we all had for the same thing, depending on where we came from...it was all very much fun."

Rocio met the love of her life at EARTH, Kloeber Oliveira, '94, the father of her two sons, with whom she shared wonderful moments, until "God, for reasons that a human being cannot understand, decided to take him to fulfill a more important duty: to be an angel looking after – among many others – my sons and me."

Life often comes full circle, and Rocio still has dreams, "I have left in God's hands my desire to work for an NGO in the area of human development. This would complete the process of professional growth that began for me so many years ago at EARTH."

NEW DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT JOINS EARTH UNIVERSITY FOUNDATION
